
ENOUGH Initiative

The Engaging Neighborhoods, Organizations, Unions, Governments and Households (ENOUGH) Initiative is a first-of-its-kind state-led, place-based investment strategy designed to create poverty-fighting opportunities driven by communities, data and cross-sector partnerships.

- ENOUGH Act signed into law May 9, 2024
- Administered by the Maryland Governor's Office for Children
- Whole of government approach to ending child poverty

ENOUGH Result Areas











Cradle to Career Education: Unlocking children's potential through early care and education from birth until working in a career, specifically ensuring smooth transitions through kindergarten, middle school, and high school graduation with a pathway to college and/or career

Healthy Families: Ensuring community member and family access to high quality healthcare with goals of decreasing infant mortality, increasing life expectancy, and improving mental health

Economically Secure Families: Ensuring higher employment and entrepreneurship resulting in livable and family-sustaining wages, and stable, thriving households where families can provide for necessities, weather hard times, and build wealth

Safe and Thriving Communities: Creating communities where residents feel safe and where the built environment supports their ability to thrive, including through high-quality, affordable housing, a thriving commercial core, and access to recreational spaces, nutritious food, and transportation

FY25 ENOUGH Grant Program

<u>Purpose</u>: Funding to eligible communities to create community-driven, cross-sector partnerships to plan and advance place-based strategies that reduce child poverty and increase economic mobility.

Basic Eligibility Requirements:

- Lead Applicant
- Core Partners
- Community

Lead Applicant Eligibility Requirements



Lead Applicant is called the Community Quarterback Organization

Community Quarterback organization may be any of the following:

- community-based organization
- non-profit organization
- local government entity
- Local Management Board
- Community Action Agency

Core Partners Eligibility Requirements



Minimum* required partners include:

- a community-based non-profit organization,
- a local government entity, and
- a public school

*Expectation is that applicants will engage a broad coalition of partners across sectors.

ENOUGH Grant Program Pathway – Three Tracks of Entry

Grant Program Track	Award Amount	Project Period
Track 1: Partnership Development	\$65,000	6-12 Months
Track 2: Plan Development	\$300,000	12-24 Months
Track 3: Implementation	Up to \$5M* (FY25)	Up to 4 Fiscal Years

^{*}Track 3: Implementation award is based on the number of children contributing to eligibility criteria in the proposed service geography. Proposed budget for Track 3 should include three additional years of ENOUGH funding. The Governor's Office for Children will help Track 3 applicants identify their multi-year budget limit.

Qualifying Criteria to Apply for Each Grant Program Track



MEETS COMMUNITY ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

Communities that have at least one U.S. Census tract where more than 30% of children are living in poverty AND (2) is served by a community school with a concentration of poverty level of at least 80%



COMMUNITY QUARTERBACK

Community-led organization with resources and capacity to lead ENOUGH activities and manage ENOUGH funds, in coordination with community partners



PARTNERSHIP COLLABORATIVE

A robust partnership of community-led organizations representing each of the ENOUGH results areas

An established partnership governance structure to ensure alignment, information sharing, and resource deployment



COMMUNITY NEEDS ASSESSMENT

Completed needs assessment identifying assets and gaps, informed by community data and residents' input



NEIGHBORHOOD ACTION PLAN

An action plan that leverages various funding streams to address gaps identified in the needs assessment and provide a continuum of services for the community across ENOUGH results areas



Partnership agreements in the ENOUGH Act

ENOUGH Act requires a minimum of the following be included in partnerships...

- Community-based, non-profit organizations
- **Local government entity**, and
- A public school

All grant applicants requires applicants to have signed letters of commitment from partners, and for Track 2 and Track 3, must also include (among others):

- **Descriptions of the partnership** and how you collaborate
- The partnerships **governance and accountability structure** (or how you'll develop one)
- How the partnership creates clear roles for youth, families, people, and groups with lived experience or most impacted locally
- How partners **share and use data**
- Signed partnership agreement that includes clear roles, responsibilities and commitments

What are partnership agreements?



What they are

- What everyone in the partnership commits
 to doing to create safe, supported, open,
 productive, and trusting environment to
 allow for the partnership to do its best work
 and achieve results
- An aspiration or collective vision for how people want to work together
- Agreements explicitly developed and implemented by the group



- A playback of how organizations currently work together
- Rules or mandates that enforced formally

Why partnership agreements?

Transforms a group of people into a team with a common framework for changing outcomes and systems

Clarifies the roles and responsibilities necessary to achieve desired results

Creates commitment to shared accountability, while enabling courageous conversations

Process of developing agreements improves partnership cohesion



Key elements of norms and agreements

Key elements	Summary
Right partners	Include partners with longstanding ties or deep trust in the community and those representing key sectors your plan will seek to influence and impact
Aligned to goals	Include commitments that further the work of the cross-sector partnership to achieve its desired goals
Clarify collaboration	Layout how organizations will work together (particularly for organizations in Track 2 and 3 with already existing partnerships) – including the shared

vision you're committed to, and each partner's roles and responsibilities

Possible partnership agreement sections

Call to action

The shared **mission/vision** and what you are seeking to achieve

Values and culture

The **culture** you are committed to creating and **how you may work to do that** (e.g., commitment to continuous improvement, sharing tools/resources across partners, etc.)

Network work

The core **set of work and activities** the partnership will be engaging in

Decision-making

How you will make decisions, who will be involved in decision-making, and what key decisions may be held by the partnership or various parts of the governance structure

Shared accountability

How will you work to hold yourselves and each other accountable and how might feedback be shared across partnership members

Communication

Expectations around how partners will communicate, what topics will be covered, communication frequency and ownership

Data sharing

Expectations for how data will be shared and evaluated, by who, how it will be stored and shared systems for data-sharing and ownership over data-sharing procedures

How to develop them

Convene

The set all partners are at the table, and there is a shared understanding of what network agreements are and why they are important

Create

Develop agreements that keep your ultimate results at the forefront, include input from all partners, are selected by a consensus-driven process, and outlines how each partner contributes as well as what partners need from each other

Communicate

House agreements in **shared public space** and **communicate to relevant stakeholders** and the community to create transparency and accountability

Agreements are **iterative** - as your work or partners evolve, you may need to **review and change network agreements** to ensure they are aligned to your goals and serve the group's needs


- Do the agreements outline **what you'll be working on together** as a partnership to achieve critical outcomes?
- How will the partnership agreements **enable you work collaboratively across sector** to accomplish your desired goal?



- What commitments towards collaboration and shared resonbility are you each committing to?
- How will you work to hold each other accountable to achieve results?



- How will you work together to make decisions?
- How will you ensure **families**, **children**, **organizations**, **and individuals with lived experience** are being brought into the work?

Baltimore's Promise envisions a Baltimore where all young people have access to abundant opportunities, thrive in strong intergenerational relationships, chart their own paths to success, benefit from supportive services throughout their journey from cradle to career, and achieve economic self-sufficiency. As a result...

OUR GOALS

Baltimore's Promise has 7 ambitious goals for the City's youth as they progress from childhood to adulthood:

- Babies are born healthy.
- Children enter kindergarten ready to succeed.
- Children and youth achieve at grade level.
- Youth graduate high school college and career ready.
- Youth enroll in quality post-secondary program.
- Youth earn a quality post-secondary credential or receive training in a high wage industry.
- Young adults 25 34 earn a livable wage.






Baltimore's Promise Mission








Governance for Baltimore's Promise

- 1. Multiple venues and spaces for engagement governance, and oversight with diverse sets of stakeholders.
- 2. All areas are intergenerational and participatory in nature.
- 3. Community Advisory Board, newly launched, is both a committee of the Board and shares voting power on key decisions.



Agreements Look Different Based on Your Community + Partnership Needs:



The Baltimore City Youth Data Hub required <u>state legislation</u> and <u>legal MOUs.</u>



Our Community Advisory Board was written into our <u>Board</u> <u>bylaws</u> to ensure sustainability.



The Baltimore Summer Funding Collaborative uses a set of shared operating principles.



The Youth Grantmaking initiative commits to <u>shared</u> decision-making with youth and <u>adults</u> in various ways.



Grads2Careers has roles and responsibilities laid out by partner agency and for all grantees and an MOU with the school system.



Our Community Action Groups start with a <u>shared result and</u> <u>values</u> and revisit them at start of each meeting.



Notice of Intent to Apply Due for All Tracks

July 19, 2024

Full Application Deadline for Track 2 and Track 3 September 20, 2024

Full Application Deadline for Track 1 November 1, 2024

Award Notifications Winter 2024

Estimated Project Start January 2025

NEXT STEPS: Action Items for Interested Communities
